

Hall of Fame Class of 2011

One hundred fifty skydiving enthusiasts and their friends gathered on a rainy Friday evening, September 23, to congratulate the six new inductees to the National Skydiving Museum's Hall of Fame. The new honorees – the late Uwe Beckmann and Steve Snyder, plus Lenny Potts, Tee Taylor, Jacques-André Istel, and Bill Booth – were feted at a gala dinner held at the historic Terminal A of Reagan Washington National Airport in the nation's capital. The inductees were awarded the coveted Hall of Fame blue blazer. Counting the inaugural class of 11 who were enshrined last year in Deland, FL, this brings the total to 17.

During cocktail hour, guests – many of whom had not seen each other in several years – mingled and regaled each other with jump stories from weekends past.

opened the evening's program. Cliff Schmucker, PIA president, thanked the audience on behalf of PIA, title sponsor for the event. NAA president Jonathan Gaffney served as the guest speaker. Then, museum treasurer Curt Curtis took the podium to thank event sponsors and introduce the presenters and the new Hall of Fame members.

The inclement weather neither deterred takeoffs and landings outside the terminal window nor put a damper on the evening's festivities, as the evening raised \$60,000 toward the capital campaign to build the museum. The 4 acres, which the museum already owns, is adjacent to USPA headquarters in Fredericksburg, VA.

The National Aeronautic Association (NAA) announced Lenny Potts as one of four recipients of this year's Wesley L. McDonald Elder Statesman of Aviation Awards.



Lenny serves as president of the National Skydiving Museum Board of Trustees. Lenny and his fellow recipients will be honored at the NAA Fall Awards Banquet on November 7 at the Crystal Gateway Marriott in Arlington, Virginia.

Jonathan Gaffney, chairman of the Selection Committee and president of NAA, said of this prestigious award, "As the Elder Statesman Award is synonymous with lifetime achievement, these four individuals together have contributed immensely to the advancement of our industry, the defense of our nation, and the fabric of sport aviation in the United States. The Wesley L. McDonald Elder Statesman of Aviation Award was established in 1954 to honor outstanding Americans who, by their efforts over a period of years, have made contributions of significant value to aeronautics, and have reflected credit upon America and themselves.

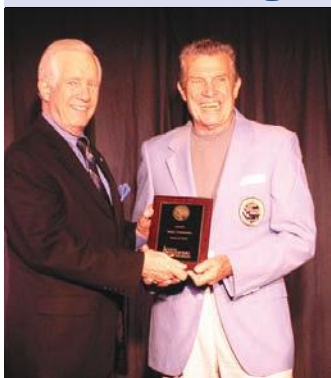
Now Accepting Hall of Fame Nominations for 2012 . . .

Remembering Ted Strong, D-16, 4/7/1936—10/14/2011

A visionary from the beginning and a man with an enormous heart passed away on October 14. Ted Strong was inducted into the National Skydiving Museum's Hall of Fame in 2010, its inaugural celebration.

"Ted Strong. . . An extraordinary man with remarkable accomplishments. An inventor, manufacturer, pilot, and skydiver, Ted Strong loved parachutes and jumping. I knew Ted for 50 years and worked for him for eight. Ted was a mentor and a friend."

Ted began parachuting in 1958 and trained jumpers at the US Military Academy at West Point until his discharge in 1961. That year, he founded Strong Enterprises, a manufacturer of parachute equipment now based in Orlando, Florida. Ted logged more than 4,900 jumps. In 1984 Ted designed and built the first tandem system, which is now the most common method for training a novice to skydive. He could always be found spending time behind a sewing machine working on new concepts. Ted Strong will be deeply missed.

Sixteen of which are still being manufactured in some fashion and all eighteen can be found flying at drop zones around the world still today.

The winning team of Bill Coe and John LeBlanc revolutionized the sport of skydiving and continues to meet the needs of today's diverse skydivers with models like the Sabre2, Lightning, Stiletto, Spectre, Velocity, Katana, Storm, Pulse, Competition Velocity, Navigator, Zero, and low-bulk Optimum Reserve. PD has also continued to support the tandem skydiving world through partnership with UPT (Relative Workshop), with the latest technologies in main and reserve tandem systems.

Production does not stop with sport canopies however, as PD has taken the state-of-the-art technology and applied it to various military needs for operational equipment that allows troops to safely conduct and carry out missions in hostile environments. PD currently has 8 operational models in use around the world.

Through the last 30 years Bill and John have been serving the skydiving community with new and innovative technology and designs that have changed with the times.
